# Vienna's magnificent palaces

# Schönbrunn Palace

A jewel of imperial architecture and landscape design, Schönbrunn Palace and its gardens serve as a reminder to the grandeur of the once powerful Habsburg dynasty. Located on the outskirts of Vienna, this UNESCO World Heritage Site welcomes visitors to explore its magnificent palace, lavish interiors, and stunning gardens.

Once the summer residence of the Habsburg rulers, Schönbrunn Palace offers a glimpse into the lifestyle of royalty through its beautifully preserved rooms, including the breathtaking great gallery and the legendary Hall of Mirrors. The palace's Baroque architecture, adorned with frescoes, gilded ornaments, and intricate details, reflects the wealth and might of the Habsburg monarchy.

# **Hofburg Palace**

The **Hofburg Palace**, one of the largest palace complexes in Europe, is located in the heart of Vienna. In the past, it was the empire's administrative center and even hosted the Vienna congress after the fall of Napoleon.

Today, it serves as a cultural hub, housing several significant museums that invite visitors to explore the realms of history, art and royalty. Among its most notable attractions are the **Sisi Museum**, which offers a personal look into the life and legacy of empress Elisabeth, showcasing her personality and narrating her legacy.

Other noteworthy museums within the complex are the Imperial Apartments (which are part of the Sisi museum), the Imperial Silver Collection, the Imperial Treasury (see page 4) and several small museums in the newer part of the complex known as the Neue Burg.





# The Belvedere Palace

The Belvedere Palace is not only an architectural masterpiece but also home to one of the most impressive art collections in Vienna. It used to be the home of one of Austria's legendary generals, prince Eugene of Savoy.

The palace split into two palaces - the **Upper Belvedere** and the **Lower Belvedere**.

At the Upper Belvedere you will find "the kiss", one of Gustav Klimt's most iconic paintings. You will also find there art by other famous Austria artists such as Egon Schiele.

The palace itself is a marvel of Baroque architecture, surrounded by gardens that offer a tranquil escape from the bustling city.

# The Kunsthistorisches Museum (KHM)


# The Naturhistorisches Museum (NHM)

The Imperial Crown was used in the coronation of the last emperor of Austria. Charles I. The crown is made of gold and is adorned with precious gems, including diamonds. sapphires, and emeralds.

# The Schatzkammer (Imperial Treasury)

Located within the walls of the Hofburg Palace, the Schatzkammer offers a great insight into the rich past and prestige of the Habsburg Empire. As one of the most important treasuries in the world, the Schatzkammer houses an impressive collection of precious objects, jewels, and regalia that once adorned the rulers of the Holy Roman Empire and the Austrian monarchy. From ornate crowns and sceptres to priceless gemstones and ceremonial regalia, the treasury's exhibition offers a glimpse into the life and symbolic power of the Habsburg rulers.

Among the highlights of the Schatzkammer are the Imperial Crown of the Holy Roman Empire, the Austrian Imperial Crown, and the Crown Jewels of the Austrian Empire. Beyond the crowns, visitors can marvel at intricately crafted ceremonial objects, religious relics, and historic artefacts that trace the complex history of the Habsburg dynasty.

# **Nationalbibliothek**

# The Museum of Military History

One of Vienna's most underrated museums (at least in our opinion), the Heeresgeschichtliches Museum (HGM) is one of the best places to learn about Vienna's military past. It's located outside the city center, not far from Hauptbahnhof, within the grand walls of the Arsenal complex. Within it, you will find a comprehensive collection of weapons, artefacts and other priceless pieces from Austria's military history.

The museum lets you explore the history of warfare in a somewhat chronological order. It begins upstairs with medieval knights and imperial armies and ends at the entrance floor with the dark days of the World Wars and beyond. There, you will learn about military equipment and its evolution and about iconic battles such as the historically significant battle of Vienna against the Ottomans. The museums displays some incredible objects such as the car of Archduke Franz Ferdinand, in which he was assassinated. It's truly a fascinating museum you should include in your travel itinerary.

# **Welt Museum**

The Weltmuseum is a vibrant museum that showcases the diverse cultures and histories of the world through its extensive collection of artifacts.

# Jüdisches Museum (Jewish Museum Vienna)

The history of Jews in Vienna is both impressive and dark. The Jewish community served an integral part of the empire's growth but was devastated during the catastrophic holocaust. The history of the Jewish community is presented in two different museums, one of which is the oldest Jewish museum in the world located in Judenplatz. There you will find the remains of an ancient synagogue that was the community's center during the middle ages. The museum displays various Jewish objects and while it's quite small it's still worth a visit.

The second Jewish museum at Dorotheergaße is larger and houses a fascinating collection of Jewish artefacts as well as changing exhibitions about Jewish life throughout the centuries.


The Wien Museum was founded in 1887. Known then as the Historical Museum of the City of Vienna, it was located at Vienna's recently completed City Hall.


# **Theatre Museum**


# Vienna's Film Museum

# Viktor Frankl Museum

Vienna's little but powerful Viktor Frankl Museum is the first of its kind in the world. From the end of World War II until his death in 1997, the renowned physician and philosopher himself resided in the house that is now home to the museum. In March 2015, the museum opened, coinciding with the 110th birthday of Holocaust survivor Viktor E. Frankl.

Currently, Viktor Frankl's office serves as an inspirational museum where guests are progressively introduced to his life, philosophy, and psychotherapy. While discovering the evolution of this great personality, guests also acquire understanding of their own prospects and individual capabilities.

Delve into the life and work of the father of psychoanalysis at the Sigmund Freud Museum, located in the heart of Vienna's Alsergrund district.



# **Imperial Crypt**

Since 1618 the Capuchins' Crypt in Vienna has been the family burial vault of the Habsburgs - a monument and symbol of sovereign power, which clothed its own impermanence with beauty. Multiple extensions and modifications over four centuries extended the crypt to a total of ten vaults, which now hosts the sarcophagi, urns and funerary monuments of the Habsburgs.

In this way the Imperial Crypt is one of Vienna's top sightseeing attractions to discover the Habsburgs family history from a different point of view.

# **Stephansdom**

Stephansdom, one of Vienna's most recognisable symbols, standards on the ruins of an earlier ancient Roman church, built and dedicated to St. Stephen in 1147.

The Cathedral Museum has in its collection paintings from the 18th century, sculptures of the Virgin and Child dating from the 16th and 17th centuries, and even some Medieval-age carvings. Stephansdom's most precious objects are now found in their own exhibition: the Treasure, found in the cathedral's west gallery.

# Funeral Museum Vienna

The Funeral Museum at Vienna's Central Cemetery gives insights into the funeral and cemetery culture of past centuries.

More than 250 original objects and photographic material are on display, including an original "Fourgon" (coach for transporting bodies) from around the year 1900. A heart palpitation knife and a life-saving clock are the most bizarre exhibits: They date to a time when people worried about being buried alive!

# Undertaker Museum

Located near the Schloss Belvedere in an old funeral home, this museum contains more than 600 artifacts documenting Viennese funeral and burial rituals.

On display are black uniforms worn by the pallbearers (Pompfüneberer), as well as hearses, lanterns, torches, black flags, photographs of corpses seated in chairs and a "sitting coffin". Also on display is the reusable coffin, introduced in 1784 by Emperor Josef II in an effort to conserve wood and speed up decomposition.

# **Museum of Art Fakes**

The Museum of Art Fakes (Fälschermuseum) is a small gallery devoid of any original artwork. There are pieces in the collection that look like they belong to famous artists like Matisse, Rembrandt, and Klimt, but were actually made by an enterprising forger.

The collection also features some well-known forgers, such as Tom Keating, who faked over 2,000 pieces to protest the corruption of the art world, planting "time-bombs" in his copies so that any unsuspecting collector would be unable to recognize the fakes. A number of fake diary pages that are said to have been written by Adolf Hitler are also on show at the museum.

# Papyrus Museum

Situated underground within the National Library of Austria, the modest Papyrus Museum's exhibits may appear insignificant when compared to other notable museums with items such as a prenuptial agreement or a recipe, with very few well-known names visible. However, because of the displays' historical significance and age-some of the papyrus sheets date back over 3,000 years—their value may even surpass that of those more well-known pieces!

There are a few non-papyrus objects in the museum as well. For instance, tiny groups of stelas, or gravestones, and mummy labels. Needless to say, the Papyrus Museum collection can now be found on UNESCO's Memory of the World Register.


# **Zoom Children's Museum**


